

What's all the fuss?



This picture shows a simulation of what the proposed extension to the Village Hall will look like – although the real thing will of course be painted to match the existing woodwork! So what is all the fuss about, you may ask?

The extension may not look like a huge

change, being only a few yards (4.25 metres, actually), but it will be a valuable improvement on the existing arrangement, housing a permanent stage and creating a new room within the hall. So who will benefit from the extension?

There's no doubt that the stage will be a great asset to the Pantomime group. The present stage is heavy and cumbersome and is currently stored in farm buildings on the outskirts of the village. Whenever the stage is needed it requires hard work and generous help to get it shifted and assembled. The old stage is getting rather worn and beaten now and needs replacing. A new stage will put a spring in the step of all the panto troupe, and let's face it, some of them are getting on a bit!

Extending the hall will also mean that there is more room for seating in the hall, so if you've ever found yourself unable to get one of those "gold dust" Saturday Night tickets for the Pantomime, the extension may just help!

Of course, it isn't just the Panto group who use the stage. The Tattler Quiz nights, which can also be a bit of a squeeze, and other quizzes also use the stage. Many other groups have also expressed an interest in using a permanent stage. The WI will be able to provide guest speakers with a platform and the art classes that take place in the hall should find it useful. The stage will be useful for private hirings such as parties and dances. The Bowls Club will welcome the extension as the extra space will provide a viewing area.

The extension will also provide a small storage room. This will free up the existing storage room so that it can be used as a meeting room for committees and clubs. This will prove to be much more economical than heating up the whole hall for a few people.

The Village Hall is a great asset, serving the many activities that make this village such a wonderful place to live. We should ask ourselves, do we just let the hall stay the same as it is, or do we invest in it, making it more useful for everyone, and keeping the village activities alive?

The response to the Village Hall Appeal so far has been very encouraging, but we still need everyone to dig deeper into their pockets.

So far the village and its societies have raised £5,087.39p towards our £10,000 local target. Overall, with promises of grants etc. we have raised £21,000 towards our £40,000 target. We are applying for other grants but they are by no means certain and we need every bit of support from the village we can get. So please try to support all the fund raising activities and send as much money as you can to Gill Cruickshank, The Old Vicarage, Tuddenham St Martin.



Tuddenham boy short listed for National Award

The Whitbread Young Achiever Awards aim to recognise and reward exceptional, and often unsung, contributions by young volunteers nationwide, aged between 16 and 25. 18 year old Al (Alistair is Denny's son) Read from Tuddenham was nominated for the Arts Award along with hundreds of young people across the UK. Al was nominated for the work he did with Ipswich - based film and theatre company, Red Rose Chain. According to Joanna Carrick, a director at Red Rose Chain, who nominated him for the award, Al has devoted several hours every week to voluntary work with the company, working with socially excluded young people. He has developed several film and theatre projects, tackling issues that affect young people including bullying, alcohol abuse, and teenage pregnancy. The video on bullying, "Bad Behaviour", is now used in secondary schools nationwide.

Al was on the final short list of three and on 28th September attended the award ceremony in the Peter Morano building in London. Sampling sushi and salmon nibbles, mingling with the likes of Duncan Goodhew and Hazel Irvine with television's June Sarpong acting as Master of Ceremonies, it really was a classy affair. Although Al did not win the final award the amount of support given and opportunities offered was amazing. Al now has an incredible year to look forward to, fully supported by Whitbread, in which he hopes to set up something in partnership with the winner of the Young Achiever Arts Award, Kirsty Munro.




NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH
